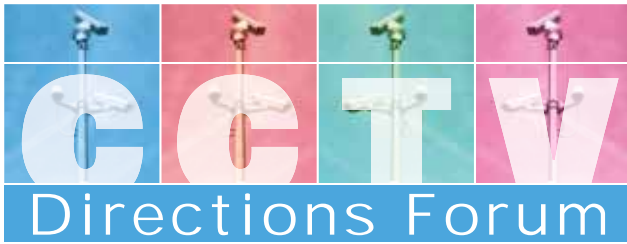
This two day forum is proudly supported by Logan City Council and will be held at the Beenleigh Events Centre located at the corner of Crete and Kent Streets, Beenleigh.

Run over two days, the CCTV Directions Forum will be held in Logan City. During the first day presentations will include the following topics:

- CCTV in Australia and New Zealand: Reflections on local and international experiences including funding, regulation and licensing
- New CCTV Technologies and Trends: Getting the bells and whistles in focus
- Intelligence, Evidence and CCTV: Security and operational considerations
- CCTV and the Law: Legal issues and experiences
- CCTV and Privacy: Meeting legislative and moral obligations

Local City Council will also be presenting their experience with CCTV in public spaces, and providing the opportunity for participants to see aspects of their program in action.

The second day includes parallel sessions and roundtable discussions lead by the speakers, followed by an open forum during which delegates will have the opportunity to advance ideas to be compiled and sent onto regulators.

Amongst many other issues, the presentations will explore the challenges faced by property managers, retailers and other private sector CCTV system operators, where private cameras cover public space as well as privately owned but publicly accessible space.

Professor Rick Sarre will present information relating to legal issues, regulation and privacy, including revised material published in the second edition of their invaluable book, "The Law of Private Security in Australia". This book was first published in 2005 and contains chapters devoted to, amongst other things, privacy, electronic surveillance and legal liabilities.

Ultimately, most CCTV systems are intended to contribute to risk managing objectives, but all too frequently the objectives for the systems and individual cameras are not well defined. This lack of clarity in objectives makes it difficult to calculate a return on the CCTV investment. You will not want to miss the practical presentations, which explore the "ROI" plight of both public and private sector CCTV system owners.

It is somewhat self-evident that in many cases, video from publicly and privately owned CCTV systems is destined for use in support of investigations and possible prosecutions. Regrettably, the true potential of this resource is often not able to be realised due to a variety of factors. The presentation on "Intelligence, Evidence and CCTV" will explore internal and external use of CCTV systems for operational security, prosecution and intelligence purposes.

Rick Draper is a career Crime Prevention and Security Risk Management professional with over 25 years experience. He is also an Adjunct Senior Lecturer in the School of Criminology and Criminal Justice at Griffith University in Brisbane.

He has undertaken reviews of public space CCTV systems for a number of local governments. For example he was engaged by the NSW Ministry for Transport to review the trial of cameras in NSW taxis and subsequently contributed to drafting the specifications for those systems. He also reviewed the application of CCTV in NSW buses. Among many other projects he prepared the specifications for a new multi-site IP based CCTV system (including analytics) for major shopping centres and office buildings in Canada. He was recently engaged by the Western Australia government to undertake a strategic review of CCTV in public and private sector applications.

Rick holds a degree in education with the equivalent of a major in studies in justice. Prior to earning his degree, he obtained electrical trade and electronics qualifications and worked extensively in the electronic security industry, giving him valuable experience in the technical aspects of security systems and vulnerability identification.

Rick Sarre

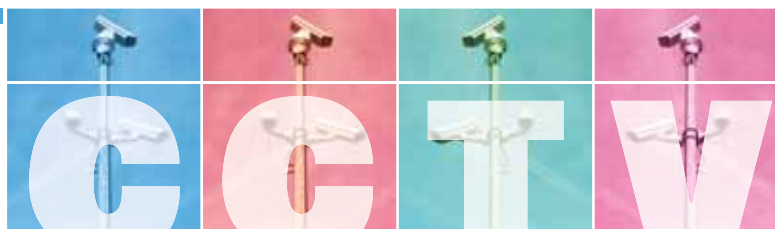

Rick's research interests include Security Law, Criminal Justice, Corporate Governance, Private Policing, Sport Law, Regulation, Business Aspects of Project Management.

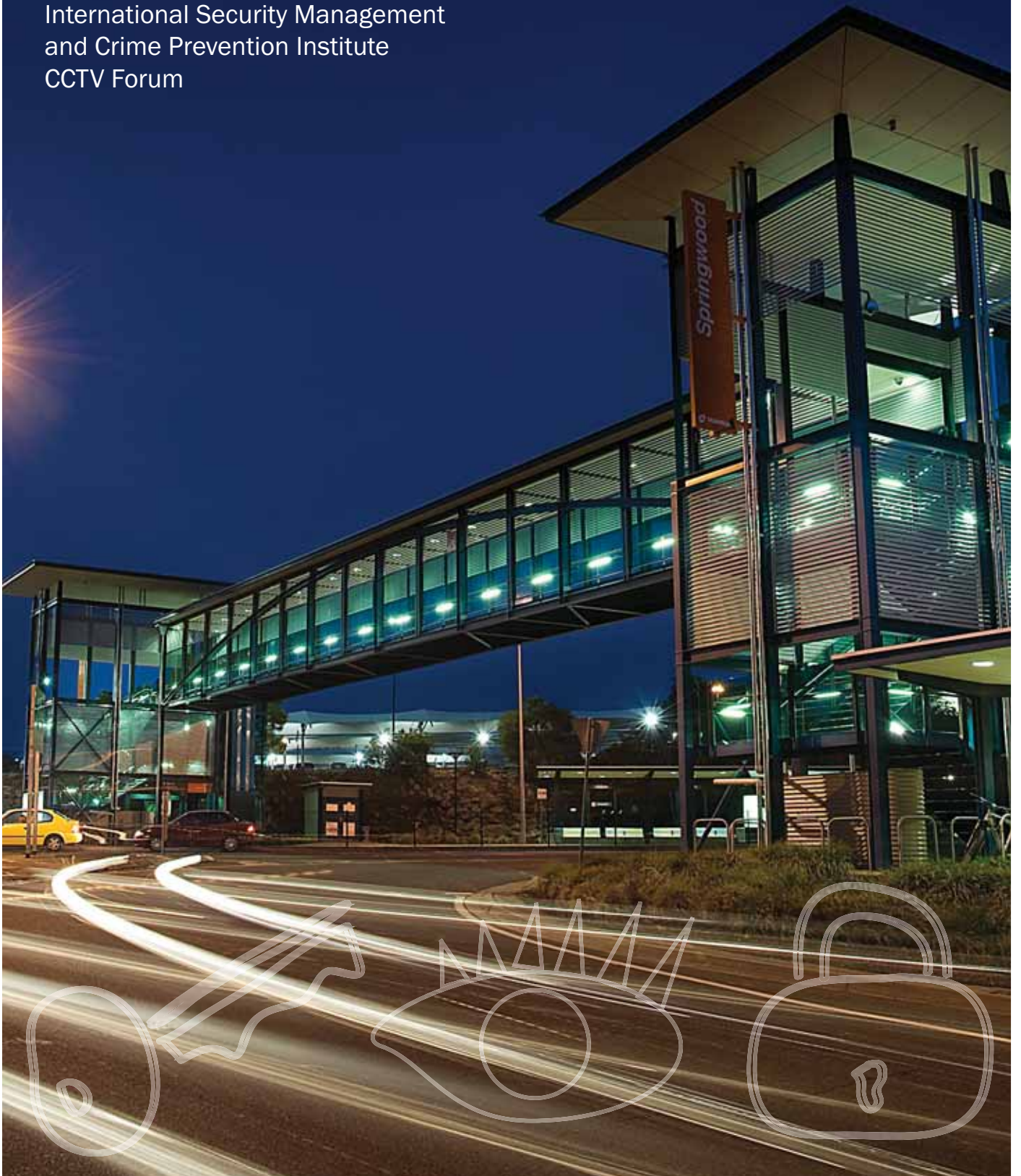
